"It is crucial that anyone 12-years-old and older who has not yet been vaccinated against COVID-19, get vaccinated so they can return to learning and socializing in an environment safe from the virus and beneficial to their intellectual and social development."

Many medical practices and pharmacies are administering the vaccine, which is free of cost to the patient. The Pfizer vaccine is approved for those aged 12 and up.
